AMERICA—

Last week, Norway, Sweden, Denmark and Holland, joined the League of Nations, apparently having no fear for their sovereignty and independence. The great powers of Europe, with the exception of Germany and Russia, are members of the league. So are several of the American countries. As we have seen, European neutrals feel that their interests demand that they come into it. But we hesitate, fearful of everything except the frightful evils which the league is designed to prevent. No objection has been too trivial to furnish a basis for criticism and objection. Senators have assumed that the president, or a combination of foreign powers, might commit us to action forbidden by our Constitution. They have haggled even over the question whether this nation should be allowed to assume the obligation of paying its share of the cost of administration.

If things continue to go as they are going, America will soon be enjoying what the English used to call—they know better now—a "splendid isolation." There can be no such thing in the civilized world as an isolated nation. Our national policy must be very largely determined by our relation or want of it to the league of nations. Secretary Daniels was quite right in saying that we should need a greatly larger navy if we refused to join the league. That is something that any one could understand.

Our rate of national taxation is therefore dependent in no small degree on our policy with reference to the league of nations. We shall find "splendid isolation" very costly. We cannot have the largest navy in the world without paying for it, and it will have to be paid for out of taxes collected from the people. And so of the army. Unless we co-operate we must compete; unless we become a partner of other nations we must be a rival. The people would do well to ask themselves whether they desire to be relieved of any of the burdens that they have been carrying. There is something beside idealism in the league of nations issue—something exceedingly practical.

HOOVER IS INDEPENDENT

New York, March 10.—(Special to Daily Democrat)—Herbert Hoover has definitely refused to align himself with any of the organized parties as at present constituted, characterizing himself as an "independent progressive."

The former world food controller said that before the war he was a progressive republican but that during the war he was a non-partisan. The group of western friends who elicited this much information from the politically tactful Hoover, accepted the theory that "once a republican always a republican" and intimated they would immediately launch a campaign to "draft" him for the republican presidential nomination.

"I am not seeking public office and, consulting my own personal inclinations, I do not want public office," Hoover wrote to this group who recently conferred with him.

HE DID THE RIGHT THING

Indianapolis, Ind., Mar. 10.—(Special to Daily Democrat)—William G. McAdoo, in a telegram to Walter Meyers, made public here today, endorsed the action of his Indiana supporters in withholding his name from the Indiana primary ballots. Meyers made the telegram public in answer to the charges that the McAdoo men were "asleep" when the Marshall and Edwards petitions were filed. "You did exactly the right thing in not filing petition to place me in Indiana presidential primary," the telegram said. "You know of course that I stand for untrusted delegates. Your action, therefore, was entirely in line with my desires."

MADE IT EASY JOB

Chicago, Ill., Mar. 10.—(Special to Daily Democrat)—Abolition of the sawed-off shot gun as a means to prevent bank hold-ups substituting state constabularies, was advocated here today by bankers attending the ninth annual conference of the Central States Bankers' association. Bank robberies last year, according to W. W. Bowman, Topeka, Kans., were greater than in any previous year, "due to the lure of the liberty bond which was so easily negotiable." The only way to stop bank hold-ups and prevent crime is for every state to have a state constabulary such as Pennsylvania has, said Bowman. "This constabulary should be equipped with horses, motorcycles and automobiles," he declared.

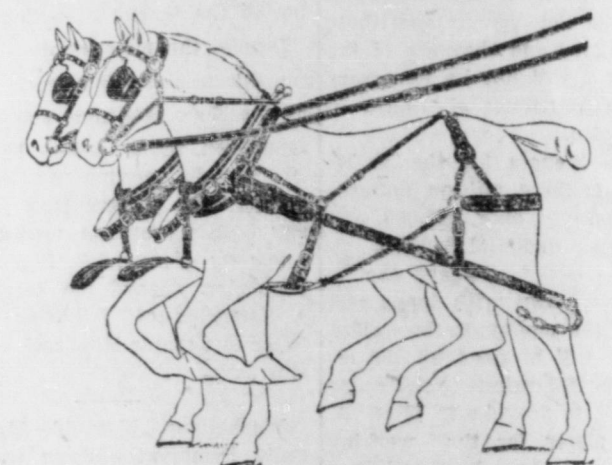
