

WATCH THE BEES

Season for Inspection to Detect Any Disease That May be Present

REQUIRE MORE FOOD
That Will Stimulate Them to Action—Many Bee Keepers in County

County Agent Gray furnishes us the following communication that the bee-keepers of the county may get the benefit. Read it, if you have bees on your place, and profit thereby:

"If the bees have been well cared for during the winter they are beginning to get uneasy and want to go to work as soon as the just warm days arrive. At this time the hive should be opened and an examination made in order to ascertain whether there is still a good supply of food on hand. They will now require more food than they did while practically dormant. If the food is scarce feed them. This will not only stimulate the workers to action but will also induce the queen to begin laying earlier than she might otherwise.

"Another reason for inspection is to see if any disease is present. This not only is important to you but to every bee-keeper in the county. Destroy all the diseased frames and then clean up everything that could in any way spread infection. There are about three hundred and fifty bee-keepers in the county and it is to the interest of each one of you that all diseases promptly dealt with."

FEBRUARY EXPORTS SHOW DECLINE

A decided drop in exports was the outstanding feature of the February foreign-trade statement issued today by the Bureau of Foreign and Domestic Commerce, Department of Commerce.

February exports amounted to \$646,600,000, the smallest since October of last year, against \$722,000,000 in the preceding month of January and \$585,600,000 in February of last year. Exports during the eight months ended with February were \$5,231,000,000, against \$4,383,000,000 in the eight months of last year.

February imports amounted to \$467,600,000, against \$474,600,000 in January of this year and \$235,600,000 in February a year ago. Imports during the eight months period ended with February amounted to \$3,235,600,000, against \$1,933,000,000 a year ago. The imports during these eight months, representing two-thirds of the current fiscal year, exceeded by \$140,600,000 the imports during the entire fiscal year ended with June, 1919.

Imports of gold during February were unusually small, amounting to only \$4,473,000, against exports of \$43,600,000. For the eight months period ended with February gold imports amounted to \$12,000,000 in February and \$68,600,000 in the eight months, while silver exports were \$16,000,000 for the month and \$137,600,000 for the eight months ended with February.




