

Add the \$19,757.35 to the \$5,978.00 and you get a total of \$25,735.35, which is the increase that the Adams county taxpayers must send to the state, besides losing the seventeen thousand dollars of the automobile tax. There is an increase in everyone of the five state funds and Mr. Zoercher cannot dispute this fact. The taxpayers know this, the tax receipts show the increase and it will do him no good to have his letters printed in every republican paper in the state.
