Sunday afternoon at 2 o'clock will begin the great drive in the Inter-church World Movement in Decatur. Four churches at this time will start the work of raising the amounts allotted to them, the Baptist, United Brethren, Reformed and Presbyterian churches. The Methodist church has already made its canvass in the centenary movement, and is counted in the Interchurch program. The Evangelical congregation will make its drive in June, because of other matters in the congregation planned at this time. The following amounts are to be raised by each church enlisted in the Interchurch movement: Presbyterian, 1 year ..... \$1,900; Baptist, 4 years ..... 6,500; Reformed, 5 years ..... 7,200; United Brethren, 2 years ..... 2,700; Evangelical, 5 years ..... 2,000; Methodist, 5 years ..... 29,000.

The Methodist church, however, secured subscriptions amounting to nearly \$40,000, and went away over the quota. The homes of parishioners will be visited by canvassing teams during the afternoon Sunday, and the church membership is expected to stay at home until after the teams have visited them.

The Presbyterian church will make its annual every-member canvass for local expenses for the next year at the same time.

The financial culmination of many months of organization and education of the members of Protestant churches in Indiana and the nation will come Sunday, April 25th, the opening day of a week's financial campaign of thirty Protestant denominations in the cooperating units of the Inter-church World movement.

A dozen more denominations have formally expressed their sympathy with the movement. The names of the thirty denominations which will take part in the simultaneous campaign will be wound up in New Jersey tonight.

The last between Major General Leon Wood and Senator Hiram Johnson's republican endorsement at state's primary Tuesday became several weeks ago, resulting in the most intensive political maneuver that has yet developed.
