

## AGAIN DEFEATED

Decatur High School Base Ball Team Loses to Van Wert High School

BY SCORE OF 11 TO 5

Local Outfield Shows Up  
Strong — Will Play Convoy Tomorrow

The local high school base ball team was again defeated yesterday afternoon when they clashed with the Van Wert high school team in a return game, at the local diamond, the final score resulting 11 to 5. The game opened at 4 o'clock with France Center acting as official umpire, performing his duty in a very satisfactory manner.

At the opening of the first inning, as customary, the locals took the field, during which time the visitors crossed the plate for one score. During the time the local team was at bat, they also succeeded in bringing in one run, tying the score at 1 to 1. The visitors continued to score throughout the game, managing to bring at least one run in each inning, shutting the locals out until the eighth inning, when they registered three more runs, and one in the ninth inning, making the total score 11 to 5. Case, White and Myers were the batters for the locals.

Much credit is due to the strong outfield of the local team, each man playing a good game. "Simp" Durkin, star center fielder for the locals, appeared at his best, as usual, he covering his field with great ability, and captured his share from out of the locals.

The defeat of yesterday marks the fourth successive defeat for the locals, but with a number of games still to be played this season, they entertain high hopes of making up for their loss. They will journey to Convoy Friday afternoon, where they will cross bats with the Convoy high school for the first time this year.
