

## TROOPS ON GUARD

(United Press Service) Bristol, R. I., May 29.—(Special to Daily Democrat)—Three troops of state militia were on guard here today, following a riot between strike sympathizers and private detectives of Boston at the plant of the National India Rubber company, in which three persons were shot and more than a score injured.

Plans to prevent a recurrence of the trouble were made at a conference of Adj. General Abbott Jr., and members of the town council. Governor Beckman is expected to arrive here today.

## STUDENT WAS SHOT

(United Press Service) Madison, Wis., May 29.—(Special to Daily Democrat)—Carl E. Jandorff of Grand Rapids, Mich., a sophomore at the University of Wisconsin, was dead here today following a clash between students and a policeman.

Patrolman Matthew Lyanga killed Jandorff when students attempted to force the release of a freshman, arrested for stealing a barber pole, students said today. The barber pole was used in a bonfire for freshman cap night.

Jandorff led the students threatening to take the prisoner from Lyanga according to witnesses. Lyanga claimed today he warned the boy twice before firing.

Jandorff's father owns a string of delicatessen stores in Michigan and Ohio.

When reporting a fire, call Central and give her the name of the party's residence or place of business, and on what street same is located.

When a subscriber's residence or place of business is afire Central will use every method to inform you of same.

DO NOT CALL CENTRAL TO LEARN WHERE THE FIRE IS BECAUSE THIS PRACTICE WILL BE DISCONTINUED ON THE ABOVE DATE OF NOTICE; this is being done at the request of the firemen who have great difficulty in learning where the fire is located, due to the subscribers all calling in and making it an impossibility to answer all calls promptly and the firemen are thereby delayed in getting to the fire.

During a fire all calls will be treated as though no fire had occurred and telephone service will be continued in regular order.

These rules must be followed by all subscribers and it is only for the efficiency of getting the firemen to the scene of fire promptly that we must enforce these rules.
