Not only the bridges are showing signs of weakening, but the roadbeds on many of the main highways are showing wear. The highway superintendent is now spreading crushed stone on the Russell street highway, and this will proceed to the Henry Elting corner, a mile south of the corporation line.

Repairs are also being made to the road leading east and northeast from the Monroe street bridge. By closing the north bridge to Fort Wayne traffic is diverted over this highway, and it must of necessity be kept in good repair. Then, too, this road will be used quite extensively during the week of the Great Northern Indiana fair and the Old Home Week in August. It is also planned to oil this highway after the stone has settled to a mace. This will be greatly appreciated by those living along the route and by traffic to and from the fair grounds to the city.
