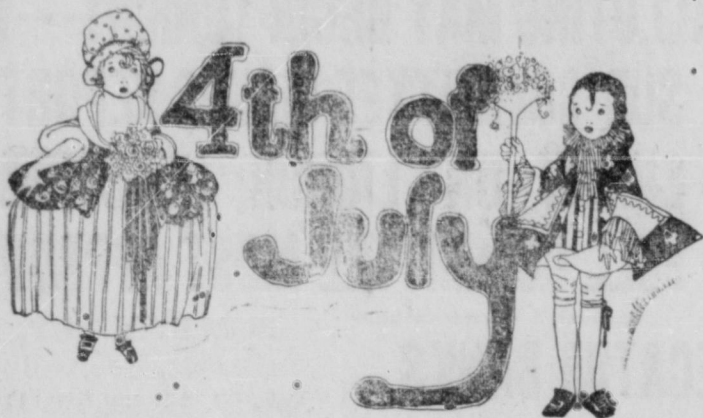

The water works committee made a report that a contract had been made with George Mumma for the drilling of one or two wells, the number to be determined after the final test has been made of the first well. The wells will be drilled north of the North Ward school building, on that ground between the street and curb. It is the plan to go at least three hundred feet down with the hope of getting approximately 100 gallons of water per minute from each well. It was necessary to seek a new location for these wells as three of the wells located on the water works site have "gone dry", while the water vein leading to the other five is not the best and it was feared that if the new wells were drilled on the same lot, it would injure the flow obtained from the others and naturally would not increase the supply. It will take about 20 days to drill the first well and those in charge of the water plant are hoping that it will be a "gusher."

Mayor Yager informed the council that he made a reply to Mr. Barnes. Since the bonds have been sold and the money made available, the city will go ahead with the improvement of the water works and electric plant and all demands for power and water will be met, not only for the time being, but in the future. With the improving of the old plant, a new power house will not be needed.
