Rotary Club Elects

OFFICERS & DIRECTORS

Dr. Lee Foster is President
—Charter for Organiza-
tion Ordered

Following the organization meeting held Tuesday evening at the Hotel Adair at which a number of Decatur Rotarians attended, the Portland Rotary club elected their officers and a board of directors Wednesday evening. Dr. Lee Foster, being elected president. The Commercial-Review says of the organization:

"At a meeting of the tentative club, held in the Elks' club rooms Wednesday evening at 7:30 o'clock the permanent organization was perfected with the election of a board of directors and officers.

"The directors elected are: Mike Ankrom, Dr. Lee Foster, George H. Smith, W. C. Hirons and J. M. Spade. The officers elected by the board of directors are: Dr. Lee Foster, president; W. C. Hirons, vice president; J. M. Spade, treasurer, and Keith Spade, secretary.

"The charter membership of the organization starts off with twenty-three, but will be expanded later. The charter members are: Dr. Lee Foster, Dr. A. C. Badders, Fred Folz, R. D. Wheat, J. E. Ohmart, J. C. Orr, C. C. Russell, N. G. Faul, J. M. Spade, Sidney Paul, Carl Bimel, Keith Spade, Charles Stewart, Clyde Bechdolt, Dave Abramson, G. H. Smith, Glen Robinson, W. C. Hirons, C. N. Nichols, A. A. Scheib, and J. A. Hood.

"The charter for the new organization has been ordered and will be here within a week or ten days, it was announced today."

The Commercial-Review also gives the following account of the organization meeting held Tuesday evening:

"Following an excellent fried chicken dinner served by George Dershem, general host of the hostelry, Dr. Lee E. Foster, who presided as toastmaster and chairman, called upon various members of the Decatur club to explain the benefits, objects and purposes of Rotarism. Practically every

visitor responded with two-minute speeches. The two main addresses were given by Dore Erwin, Decatur attorney, and Lee Vance, clothing man.

"C. E. Bell, who acted as chairman for the Decatur delegation, took up the matter of organization here. By a unanimous vote the local representatives enthusiastically agreed to immediately form a permanent organization here. Dr. Lee E. Foster was named as chairman of the organization committee by the Decatur men, and named N. G. Faul, C. E. Stewart, W. C. Hirons, George Smith and J. C. Orr as committee to select a charter membership of about twenty business and professional men. This number will be added to later by vote until the club reaches its maximum number. This committee took up the matter of naming the charter membership at a luncheon held at the Schram Cafeteria at noon.

"The Decatur Rotarians present were Dore Erwin, William Klepper, Lee Vance, George Krick, Charles Vager, Arthur Holthouse, Herman Ehinger, Randolph Horton, Jesse Sellemeyer, Oscar Laukerman, Charles Voglweide, Lawrence Kleinhenz, Oscar Huffman, Clayton Carroll and C. E. Bell."

Bryan's Five Planks

o read these all before debate. I would much prefer to read them individually."

He explained he was presenting the minority reports of the committee on resolutions, including planks to which he was opposed.

He first read a dry plank sponsored by Richmond P. Hobson, urging enforcement of the 18th amendment.

Then he read his own dry plank, as follows:

"We heartily congratulate the democratic party on its splendid lead and its submission and ratification of the prohibition amendment to the federal constitution and we pledge the party to the effective enforcement of the present enforcement law honestly and in good faith without any increases in the alcoholic contents of permitted beverages and without any weakening on any other of its provisions."

Another proposition offered by Bryan was publication of a national bulletink not a newspaper, to be published by the government, and to give equal space to the argument of all parties. He also read a proposed addition to the profiteering plank, pledging the party to drive the profiteer out of the country, eliminate unnecessary middleman, and organized cooperative societies of the purchase. This promise to retailers that retailers make public the price of articles.

Bryan opposed a plank opposing compulsory military training in peace time. He praised the peace treaty as better one than any one could expect, and then read his proposed plank, promising an amendment to the federal constitution and making it possible to ratify treaties by a majority instead of a two-thirds vote favoring an immediate reconvention of the Senate under such a rule to vote again on the treaty with reservations.

There were cries of "no."

The league plank proposed that unofficial representatives of the United States be named quickly to act for his country in the league that they be instructed to vote against war and insist on world disarmament.




