Adams county showed a decrease in population of thirteen hundred over ten years ago while the city of Decatur gained nearly three hundred according to the census figures. He has merely sketched in skeleton outline the dismal senate tirades against the league, all predicted on the manifest falsehood, that this covenant which has been accepted by all the countries of the world except anarchistic Mexico, bolshevistic Russia, bloody Turkey and backward China, means the destruction of American independence."
