After all there is no feature equal to an old home coming when the invitations are responded to as they have been this year. Nine hundred registered and perhaps as many more failed to do so. Hundreds of people met old friends again and each visitor is leaving with a good taste in his mouth and the memory of a very happy week. Come again folks to the best town and county in the state. We want you and as Col. Reppert said if you will tear up your return ticket home and stay here where you belong, you can have a check for the money invested.

Great credit is due the Red Cross organization for the splendid work at the fair grounds this week. The station took care of nearly 150 people who were either sick or injured and who would either have had to suffer great inconvenience on the grounds or have been rushed to the city. Often serious developments are prevented by first aid and the people should appreciate the efforts and splendid success of the tent hospital at the fair. Another great feature was the child welfare department where the children were looked after with care and many mothers were given a chance to rest and an opportunity to really enjoy the fair. Besides this the work of the

health board was excellent and the feature of taking care of human as well as live stock was worth while.

Back of this fair was the thing that really produced this form of entertainment many years ago, that of urging greater and better farm production. The chautauqua under Mr. Green's supervision was certainly a big part of the week and hundreds secured free of charge, information that should bring back to them many times over, the cost of attending the fair. The judging of stock and the talks by experts, was high class and participated in by the greatest men of the country. The Northern Indiana will win because the purpose is big and clean and worth accomplishing.

The board of review took the only sensible course in disposing of the tax muddle, avoiding many complications that in the end would have proven more expensive and caused much inconvenience and delay. It's a nasty dose but we had to swallow it. If the people wish more of it and even worse they will continue the republicans in power in the state.
