Franchise For Electric Line

Miller the ordinance was brought up at the meeting and amended to include sections five and six which were dropped when the ordinance was brought up at a future meeting. Section five provided that the ordinance could not be transferred, sold or assigned, while section six limited the life of the franchise to fifteen years. These two sections were stricken out at the last meeting.

The General Electric will build this line from the Rolling Mills in Fort Wayne to the G. E. factory here paying all costs and expense of upkeep and assuming all liabilities. It will carry 33,000 volts.

Every councilman voted in favor of the passing of the ordinance after it was amended.

Gets Sewer Contract
Joe Metzger, on his bid of \$1,286.00, was awarded the contract for the building of the C. N. Christen sewer. The street and sewer committee was empowered to enter into a contract with him.

Bond Was Filed
The bond of Jim Ellis as a licensed electrician was filed and referred to the electric light committee.

No Objections Filed
No objections or remonstrances were filed against the preliminary assessments on the James Rice sewer, and by resolution the assessments were confirmed and adopted and the list turned over to the city treasurer for collection.

Opening of Street
The resolution ordering the opening of Johns street and describing that property confiscated for the improvement of the street was read and adopted and the clerk authorized to advertise and receive bids for the improvement of the street.

Talk Improvements
The councilmen then made a survey of what improvements were being made at the city plant and discussed the making up of the 1921 tax budget. As soon as the engineers report their findings of the light and water plant, a petition will be made to the public service commission to increase the water and light rates.
