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COX IN INDIANA:

In his speeches in Indiana Wednesday Governor Cox discussed the league of nations in a straight forward way, and declared that it should be, as soon as it can be made so, a league of nations, and not simply one of victors. The governor said:

I favor the admission of Germany; I favor also the admission of Russia when both countries have established an orderly government. I favor the admission of even Turkey after she has had a thorough sanitary overhauling. In other words, we want to make not only the civilization of the world a better civilization, but we want to bring every government making up the civilization of the world into an agreement to make war virtually impossible in the future.

There was much discussion at Paris as to whether Germany should be admitted to the league and finally it was provided that:

Any fully self-governing state, dominion or colony not named in the annex may become a member of the

league if its admission is agreed to by two-thirds of the assembly, provided that it shall give effective guarantees of its sincere intention to observe its international obligations, and shall accept such regulations as may be prescribed by the league in regard to its military, naval and air forces, and armaments.

"Disarmament under the league," the candidate said, "means stopping the carrying of concealed weapons," and, he continued, "if the league does nothing else it will be worth while." He reminded his hearers that the league was no longer a dream, but a fact, and that most of the nations of the world were in it, and working to make it a success. The speaker said: "We and Germany, Russia, Turkey, Mexico and Henry Cabot Lodge are standing outside."

The governor repeated his charges as to the republican campaign fund. The country will wait for proof which is promised in the speech at Pittsburg tonight, before making up its mind about them. It was suggested in this paper a few weeks ago that it would be easily possible for the relations between the president and the senate to be too close and intimate, and that is true. They belong to separate departments of the government, and each should be independent of the other—must be if our government is to work well. There is on foot any effort looking to "the consolidation of the president and the United States senate," it certainly should be discouraged.

In his remarks on labor yesterday Governor Cox went pretty far when he attributed the scarcity and the high price of coal wholly to a shortage of cars. He said:

You can not operate your mines in southern Indiana or elsewhere with-

out adequate car supply. The recurrent labor troubles in the mining sections have grown out of the circumstances of the men not being enabled to keep at work. They have insisted upon a scale that would enable them to live. When the mines are closed they have no other opportunity of employment, because they are far from industrial centers. With the miner, it is not how much he receives an hour of a day, but a year. It is apparent, therefore, that the high cost of coal is not due to the miner, but to the condition of the railroads.

The republican fund of millions will not suffice to win the election. The people of this country, prosperous and happy, will not consent to turn the government over to a half dozen senators who will conduct it for a few. Those who invest in the great fund expect to get the money back with interest and you must pay. Jimmie Cox in his expose told the people that the quota for Dayton is 160,000 and that sixty times that amount will not take victory away from him in his home town. He is right there and he is right elsewhere. General Woods lost the nomination because of the expose of the fund behind him. Governor Lowden, of Illinois was turned down at the last round of the battle for the same reason. The people are not for sale.

The Berne Witness says if you vote the democratic ticket you lose your vote whether that party wins or not. We take it for granted that they believe you win by voting for Ora Davies of Kokomo, who was short in his accounts as city and county treasurer and is now a candidate for state treasurer, or by voting for Jim Watson, recognized king of lobbyist and professional politician or for Harding, the front porch performer or for many others on the list. The democratic party during the past eight years has given the people the federal reserve law as well as many others and has done more for the public than has any administration in a half century.

One of the popular methods of distributing funds in a campaign is the placing of money in the hands of agents in various communities for the purpose of betting on the results of election, the idea being that this arouses the confidence of the workers and disturbs the opposition. There are indications that this plan is now being used in Adams county as well as elsewhere and Senator Pomrenne of Ohio is investigating the plan which will very probably be exposed in a rather startling manner before election day.

The way to help make your government better is to vote and to do that you must register September 4th or you will not be qualified. Every man and woman who is over the age of twenty-one is entitled to cast a vote but they must register in the precinct in which they live and that includes you. Who wants to be outside the army which has a legal right to select the officials of the county, state and nation. Qualify on September 4th and then vote in November.

Dallas, Texas, August 28.—(Special to Daily Democrat).—Texas democrats went to the primary polls today to choose between Joseph W. Bailey and Pat M. Neff for governor. Heretofore the democratic nomination has been equivalent to election.

The principal issue in the gubernatorial campaign was the "open shop," the industrial principle defended by Neff, a former speaker of the state house of representative.

The campaign was bitter. Bailey's opponents attacking the former senator's war record. In return Bailey charged that Neff, although of draft age during the war, failed to register for service. Neff presented the testimony of his mother and the records of the family Bible to refute that charge.

Would Scrap the League

saillies, is still functioning and within a few weeks will resume its committee sessions under the chairmanship of an American representative. In that body we have the framework of a really effective instrumentality of enduring peace.

"What once seems at the Hague to be a mere academic discussion has become a positive, outstanding need of facing terrifying actualities. This makes vastly easier the task of so strengthening the Hague tribunal as to render its decrees either acceptable or enforceable.

"It is not uncommon for the advocates of the league of Versailles to contrast unfavorably the Hague tribunal upon the ground that it lacks teeth.

"Very well, then, let's put teeth into it."

"If in the Versailles league there can be found machinery which could be appropriated, by all means let it be appropriated," Senator Harding went on.

"I would take and combine all that is good and excise all that is bad from both organizations." This statement, Harding said, is broad enough to include the suggestion that if the league is so interwoven with the peace of Europe, that its good must be preserved to stabilize the peace of that continent, then it can be amended or revised so that we may still have a remnant of world aspirations in 1918, build into the world's highest conception of helpful cooperation in the ultimate realization."

"It was reluctantly and with grave misgivings," that Harding voted for the league with the Lodge reservations, he said.

"But conditions have changed," he continued. "We know now that the league constituted at Versailles is utterly impotent as a preventative of wars. It is so obviously impotent that it has not even been tried. It could not survive a single test. The original league, mistakenly conceived and unreasonably insisted upon, has undoubtedly passed beyond the possibility of restoration. The matter judgment of the world will be that it deserved to pass for the very simple reason that, contrary to all of the tendencies developed by the civilizing processes of the world, it rested upon the power of might, not of right."
