way switch for the dumping of coal.

An office and weighing station will be located on the north end of the lot, and the station is equipped with the latest designed scales for the weighing of trucks. Bins are also provided on one side to take care of the over-weight, should a driver have a little too much coal on his load, or should he be a little underweight. On the south end of the lot is located a large storehouse for grain, seeds, etc. Mr. Carroll expects to use the conveyor in unloading for the public, either coal, crushed stone, gravel, sand, or anything the apparatus will handle. The entire outfit is operated with electricity, and is really an interesting piece of machinery, and Carroll & Son are to be congratulated on their progressiveness.
