Mr. and Mrs. G. Nesswald and Miss Lena Appelman left today for Fostoria, Ohio, to attend the funeral of their uncle, Joseph Hammer, who died yesterday at the age of ninety-five years. He had been bedfast for nine years. The funeral will be held Wednesday from the Catholic church.
