



BECOMING WORSE

Retail Coal Dealers Are Canceling the Contracts With Indiana Mines

OBJECT TO THE PRICE

Fixed by the Commission—Operators Insist There is Discrimination

Indianapolis, Oct. 12.—(Special to Daily Democrat)—Retail coal dealers are cancelling their contracts with Indiana mine owners on the grounds that the fuel prices fixed by the epistol coal and fuel commission are "confiscatory" and that the marginal profit is insufficient, it became known today.

According to an Indianapolis operator who exhibited cancelled contracts to bear out his statements, his means that the retailers are not going to handle Indiana coal at the price fixed by the commission.

This aspect of the price fixing controversy between the coal men and the commission apparently is the basic reason on which the operators may seek relief in federal and state courts. They contend the price list results in a discrimination on the market of Indiana coal in favor of eastern coal.

The operator asserted the mines could operate at a loss under the price list which allowed the mine owners prices on a graduated scale ranging from \$2.50 to \$5.85 a ton and that many idle mines would result.

Additional confusion surrounded the coal situation today following statements by Phil Penna, secretary-treasurer of the Indiana bituminous coal operators association, and Jesse Eschbach, chairman of the commission. Penna declared the operators would not adhere to the price fixed by the commission and he characterized untrue several assertions of the commission which is composed of Governor Goodrich and State Auditor Klaus besides Eschbach. Replying to Penna, Eschbach defied the coal men to name an operator whose mining costs exceed the prices allowed by the commission.
