Death Takes MacSwiney on Seventy-fourth Day

charges of preparing and having in his possession seditious literature. Eleven other Irish republicans about the same time went on a hunger strike two days earlier in the Cork jail.

When MacSwiney was deported to England to be placed in Brixton jail shortly after sentence, he was so weak he had to be carried aboard the steamer. It was believed then he would die within a few weeks.

The lord mayor lived, however, with only slight changes in his condition. He lived to see one of the other hunger strikers, Michael Fitzgerald, die after 68 days of fasting.

MacSwiney who was 41 years old was elected lord mayor of Cork by unanimous vote last spring after the murder of Mayor MacCurtain.

He was arrested during a session of a republican court at which he was presiding.

MacSwiney's friends charged the government wished to put him out of the way because of his restraining influence on the people of Cork which prevented them from committing acts to justify British soldiers and police in shooting inhabitants.

All through the fast there were rumors that the prisoner was being kept alive by secret feeding. This was denied alike by prison officials and MacSwiney's relatives.

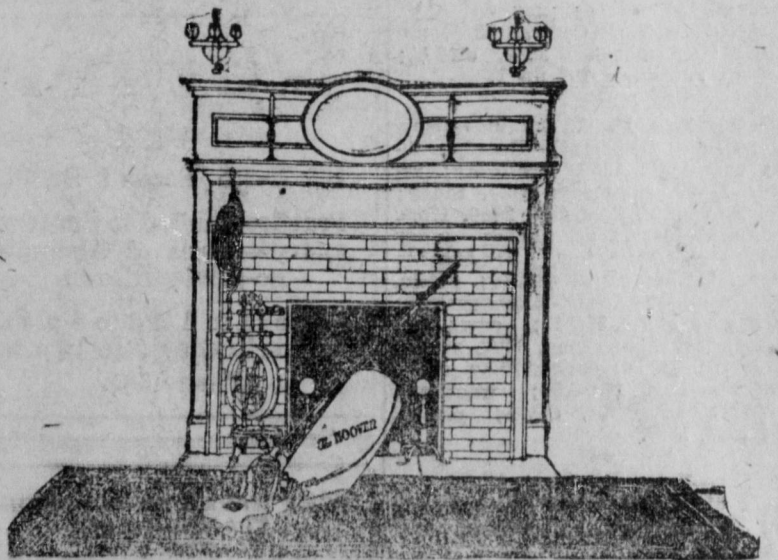
