Wife Takes Sick

(Continued from page one)

The long fast of her husband was the marvel of those who watched the case. She was at Brixton prison every day apparently always cheerful.

Even at the death of the lord mayor she retained her composure. At the inquest over MacSwiney she was so cool as to disconcert the coroner.

Last night she followed the body of her husband to St. George's cathedral and took part in the simple services that accompanied arrival there.

London, Oct. 28.—(Special to Daily Democrat)—Guarded by Sinn Fein soldiers, the body of Terence MacSwiney lay in state today in St. George's cathedral in Southwark. The casket was banked high with flowers.

The remains of the late lord mayor of Cork who died of starvation in Brixton prison after a hunger strike of twenty-four days, were carried into the cathedral yesterday afternoon, accompanied by a delegation of Sinn Fein and friends from Ireland.

Until midnight a constant stream of visitors flowed past the casket to gaze through the glass paneled lid at the unadorned features of the lord mayor. When the doors were closed at midnight there still remained large crowds who had been unable to enter.

Police offered no interference either to the parade which escorted the body to the cathedral or to the throng which swarmed about the edifice.

Funeral services today began with mass at 11 a. m., celebrated by Archbishop Mannix, with the assistance of three bishops. At 2 o'clock a procession was to leave the church to traverse several important streets to the Euston station. It was planned the cortege should arrive at the station at 4 o'clock. The body will be taken to Holyhead, tonight and transferred to a mail boat reaching Dublin early Friday morning.

An advance guard of Sinn Feiners met in uniform, and a band of Irish pipes will head the procession. Next in line will be MacSwiney's remains in a motor hearse. Next members of the family to be followed by representatives of the Irish parliamentary municipal bodies and other organizations, including London Sinn Fein clubs. Mounted police will accompany the procession. Displays of the Sinn Fein flag and colors were not forbidden.

MacSwiney will be accorded the honors of a ruler in Ireland. The Irish parliament has proclaimed Friday a day of mourning.

All business except that of news papers and public utilities will be suspended. Necessary industries were asked to suspend for a few moments at noon in honor of the lord-mayor.

CARDINAL GIBBONS' PLEA FOR THE LEAGUE OF NATIONS

The powerful statement for the league of nations by the venerable and much beloved Cardinal Gibbons ought to have a tremendous effect on the issue—the greatest moral issue ever presented to the American people. The Pope's position was set forth fully in his encyclical some time ago. And the eldest son of the church has accepted the position of Benedict and expanded upon it in a discussion of the provision of the covenant. In pointing out the provisions that most strongly appeal to him for the reversion of wars he dwells upon the provision for a three months pause between the will to war and the drawing of the sword; to the provision for open dealings in international relations; to the right under the covenant of any nation to call to the attention of the league in a "friendly" way the "conditions in any" country that may threaten the peace of the earth.

And Cardinal Gibbons has answered "Will Hays" insulting comment that the American people are more interested in their stomachs than in the "heart of the world." He has rebuked the barbarous assertion of the Hardings that we are not concerned with the rest of the world. And he has done it in language that burns:

"Sitting as a council of brethren, with the shadow of the great catastrophe still upon us, we should, and I have no doubt we will, draw nearer to one another and take up, in a fraternal spirit, certain vexed questions that still remain and which are a grave menace to the fellowship of the forward-looking, God-fearing, God-loving nations. These questions still threaten the peace of the world—that peace whose blessings we are just beginning to enjoy again.

"The world is very anxious, very weary, and many millions of the world's inhabitants are today in most miserable, desperate plight. Delay is dangerous and it means continued cumulative suffering. I know that we will, at an early day, accept our evident responsibilities in the world situation and at the same time make perfectly clear what they are. Once our responsibility is clearly established and made manifest, the American people will not sidestep. We will do our duty. We always have.

This, most all men who are true disciples of the Christ think and speak. If there is nothing in the principle of the league of nations, there is nothing in Christianity but buildings and salaries and hardware and equipment. No minister of the Gospel can afford to put his name above his Christ. The Christ-like of America is now being subjected to the acid test and there are quite a number of millions who have grown cynical who are watching the experiment with a sneer upon their lips.

We cannot imagine any one whose religion is based on the idea of their own superiority to the principles of the league of nations, for a wise man's wisdom is based on the fact that the Fort Wayne Journal-Gazette.


