Act without delay to advance in-

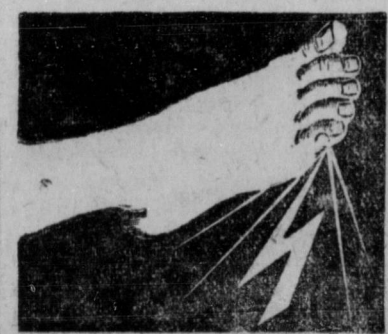

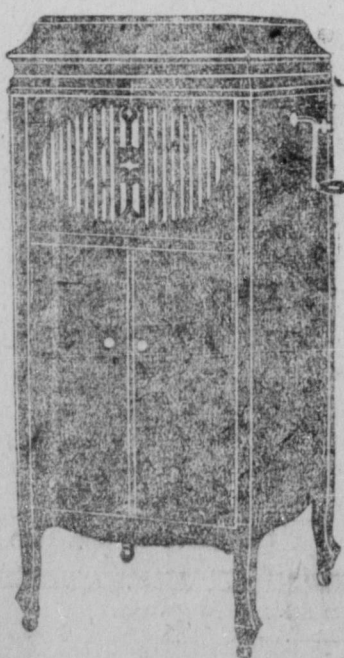
