AMERICAN RED CROSS

Wells County, Indiana, Given Favorable Mention in Latest Statement

Cleveland, O., Dec. 30—Reports from 172 out of 325 working chapters of the American Red Cross in Lake Division, which embraces Ohio, Indiana and Kentucky, give a membership of close to 600,000 in the Fourth Roll Call.

Of the chapters which have thus far reported to Lake Division Roll Call headquarters, only 24 have made final returns. Many of the chapters from which preliminary reports have been received are still enrolling members while the roll call is yet to be launched by a large number of the 153 chapters not yet heard from.

The chapters outside the metropolitan areas have made the largest comparative increases. A considerable number of chapters which did not enroll a single member in the roll call last year have brought in thousands during the Fourth Roll Call.

Columbus, O., chapter, which enrolled 75 members in the roll call a year ago, has reported to date, 6,114 members. Mahoning county chapter in Ohio has made a preliminary report of 32,790 members, compared with 19,853 in 1919; Fostoria, O., enrolled 1,000 members this year, as against none last year, and Athens county, O., whose 1919 enrollment was 1919, has obtained 4,000 members in the Fourth Roll Call.

Well county, Ind., chapter has reported 1,557 members; none last year and Johnson county, Ind., 1,200 this year, none a year ago.

In Kentucky, Breckinridge county chapter has made a return of 200 members this roll call, last year's enrollment being 22. Casey county, Ky., obtained 37 members last year, 1,000 this year, and Johnson county nine last year, 132 this year.

FOR THE FARMERS

Items of Interest to the Farmers of Adams County.

(By the County Agent)

The community organization of farmers which was effected in Union township some time ago has planned an interesting program for Wednesday evening, January 5, 1921. The feature of the program will be an address by Fred Loew, county agent of Huntington county. A set of slides on poultry will be shown.

A meeting at the Mt. Zion school in Wabash township has been planned for Friday night, December 7. The slides on poultry will be shown at this time.

The Farmers' Short Course to be held at Purdue university January 10 to 14, 1921, is planned with the purpose of getting as much practical information to the farmer as possible in a short time. None of the instruction is theoretical but is condensed down to plain, simple farm facts which can be easily understood by any farmer and can be made use of by him in a practical way.

All those attending are required to register but no tuition or admission fee is asked. A list of rooms, conveniently located will be found on file at the registration desk in the agricultural building. Board may be obtained at nearby restaurants or boarding clubs.

Several state crop and livestock associations will hold their annual meetings during the short course. The state corn show will also be held in connection with it. Many valuable premiums are offered for yellow, white and mixed corn. Every farmer is eligible. The annual students' apple show will also be held at this time. Premiums are offered in special classes to which any farmer is eligible. Exhibits consist of plates of five apples each.

Programs for the short course or premium lists for the corn show may be had by writing the county agent.

Purdue Engineers Test Water Systems

Lafayette, Ind., Dec. 31.—Water systems of the type used in residences and farm homes are now being tested at Purdue university. The particular systems now being studied are those driven by electricity which are being installed more and more in recent years as the use of electricity is being extended. Systems for use on the ordinary commercial lighting circuit and for use on the thirty-two volt farm lighting systems are included.
