(Continued from page two) understood, will insist that steps toward the readjustment of the railway debt before official relations are resumed between Washington and Mexico City.

In addition the Mexican rail lines are in a state of the utmost depreciation due to ten years of revolution and an immense amount of locomotives, rolling stock and other equipment must be purchased before rehabilitation is possible.

Reconstruction cannot start, according to the opinion here, unless Mexico secured a loan from foreign sources, obviously the United States and Mexico cannot obtain this loan, officials here declare, until a program is effected for fulfilling the right of the American bond holders.
