\$1-A-WEEK CLUB

Postmaster Bosse is Made Local Director of Universal Organization

A MILLION MEMBERS

Is Aim of the Club, and Every Man, Woman and Child is Eligible

Postmaster J. W. Bosse of this city has just received his appointment as local director of Uncle Sam's New Dollar-A-Week club, the most universal organization in the United States. Every man, woman and child is eligible to membership. The aim is 1,000,000 members.

The purpose of the Dollar-A-Week club is the creation of \$52,000,000 of new capital this year. This is made possible by the new issues of treasury savings securities in denominations of \$1 and \$25. A million members, saving systematically, can create this new capital out of current earnings. It is to such savings that statesmen look to put the world on its feet again.

"Join the Dollar-A-Week club now," suggests Postmaster Bosse. It has members from Maine to California. Put your feeble dollars to work by buying \$1 treasury savings stamps and watch them grow strong, hustling for the \$25 treasury savings certificate.

"For your own good and the good of your government, Uncle Sam expects to create a million members of the Dollar-A-Week club and this office strives for the distinction of quickly reporting its proportionate number of members. These stamps are on sale together with the other government savings securities—25 cent thrift stamps, your old friend the \$5 savings stamp, and the \$100 treasury savings certificate.

"Now don't just say that is a good idea and let it go at that but come in with your dollar today, with the determination to buy a stamp regularly.

"Twenty of the \$1 stamps and a few additional cents may be exchanged for the \$25 certificate, which yields 4½ per cent. interest. So you see that instead of paying dues to belong to the Dollar-A-Week club you are making money thereby, building up a reserve for future financial independence.

"The new Dollar-A-Week club is a big brother to the Twenty-Five-Cent Thrift club in the schools, through which the school children are striving to add several million dollars to the nation's new capital. Thrift meters have recently been installed in the schools to create a spirit of helpful rivalry between the boys and girls, designed respectively as "Uncle Sam's Team" and "Columbia's Team."

In the industries, or wherever there is an employer, the Dollar-A-Week club operates through the payroll deduction plan. The employer, with the sanction of the employee, puts a \$1 stamp in the pay envelope in place of a dollar bill. It is the safest savings plan in the world, for the \$1 stamp is backed by the same government that is behind the dollar bill.

"There is no restriction on the amount that may be saved through the Dollar-A-Week club. In some of the large industries where the plan already is well established many of the workers are saving enough for a \$25 certificate a month.

"The \$1 stamps are on sale at the postoffice. Each week the postmaster will post on the bulletin board the number of members of the Dollar-A-Week club in this community. This figure will represent the total sales of \$1 stamp, whether bought by individual or employer.

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"Let this community be the first to make a 100 per cent. showing!"

ROAD BUILDING HELD UP

Indianapolis, Feb. 9.—Road building in Indiana will be held up until the price of materials fall to a level satisfactory to the state highway commission, it was learned here today.

"The state highway commission will not let any contracts for roads until the price of materials come down," said G. R. Harr, assistant chief engineer of the highway commission. "The only roads that is now under construction on contracts awarded by the commission, is one in Warrick county, the contract for this having been let in 1919. Construction of a Lake county road, which was to have started last week was delayed because of bad weather.

"The commission opened bids last week, but no contracts were let, as the commission felt that in the near future, the prices would be lower and that to let the contracts now would put additional expense on the people.
