WANTS LAW KILLED.

Washington, Feb. 17.—(Special to
Daily Democrat).—Attorneys General
of New York and nineteen states join-
ed forces here today to have the Esch-
Cummings transportation law declar-
ed unconstitutional by the United
States Supreme court.

The transportation law gives com-
plete control of all railroad commerce
in the United States, including inter-
state commerce commission accord-
ing to a statement issued by the at-
torneys general following their meet-
ing. This in effect makes these elev-
en men directors of American indus-
try it was charged.

As the first step in their battle to
kill the law the attorneys decided to
file a joint brief in the Wisconsin rate
case. This case involves a conflict
of authority between the interstate
commerce commission and the Wis-
consin state utilities commission.

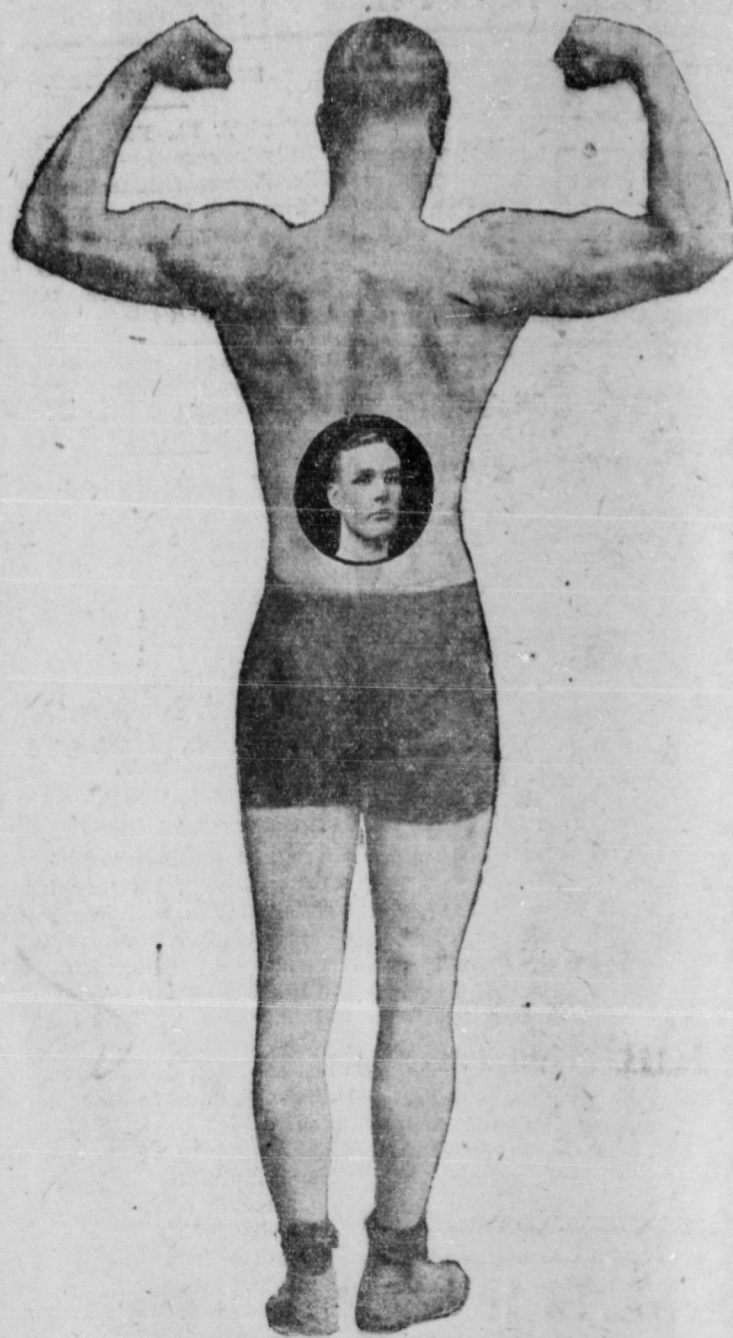

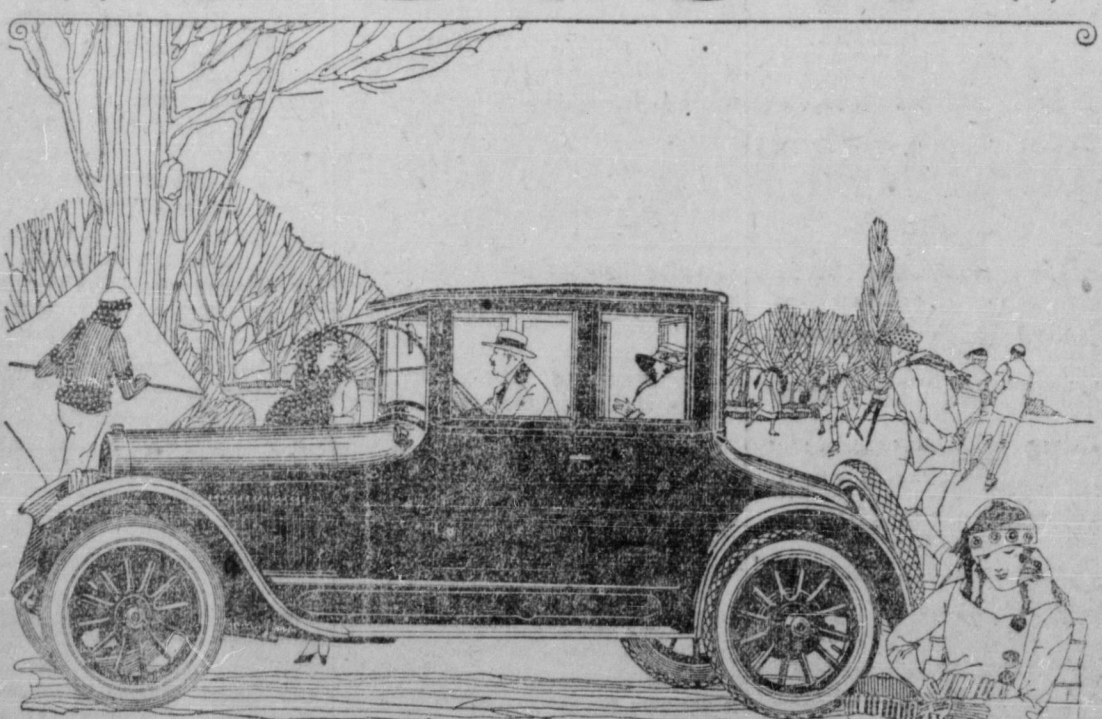
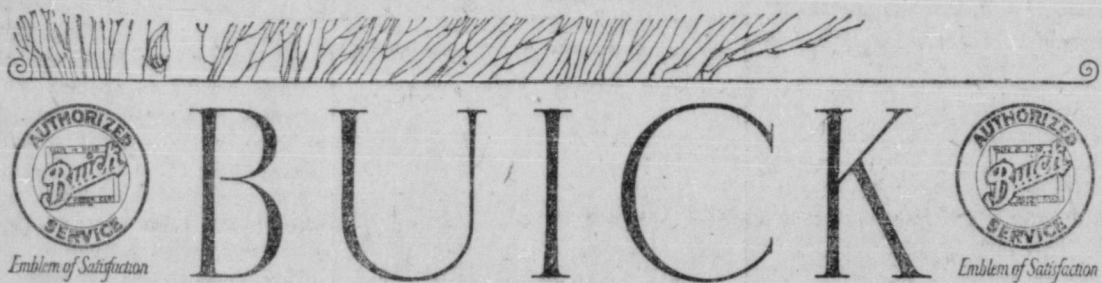
