QUOTAS ARE ANNOUNCED

Cleveland, Ohio, April 28.—Quotas
of garments and layettes to be pro-
duced for the hundreds of thousands
of waifs of central and eastern Euro-
pe by volunteer workers of the Amer-
ican Red Cross have just been an-
nounced for Lake Division, which now
embraces Ohio, Indiana, Michigan, West
Virginia and Kentucky. The division
quota of 300,000 garments for boys
and girls up to 14 years and 38,000
layettes has been apportioned as fol-
lows:

Ohio, 100,000 garments; 15,000 lay-
ettes; Indiana, 70,000 garments; 8,500
layettes; Michigan, 70,000 garments;
8,500 layettes; West Virginia, 30,000
garments; 3,000 layettes; Kentucky,
30,000 garments; 3,000 layettes.

CHOCOLATE CARAMELS

Put one cup of fine broken or grad-
ed chocolate, one cup of molasses,
the same amount of rich milk and
sugar and two heaping tablespoons
of butter into a granite saucepan.
Stir over a slow fire until thorough-
ly mixed, then boil slowly until it
cracks when dropped into ice water.
Turn into greased tins and mark in
to squares before the mixture be-
comes cold.

LEMON JELLY

Soak one envelope of gelatine in
one cup of cold water five minutes.
Dissolve with one pint of boiling
water, add three-fourths cup of sugar,
stir until dissolved and when cooled
add three-fourths cup lemon juice.
Strain and turn into molds.

Items of Interest to the
Farmers of Adams
County.

Adams County Pig Club Progressing.

The Duroc pig club which was be-
gun some time ago by the Adams
County Duroc Breeders' association,
is steadily gaining members. It is ap-
parent that many boys and their par-
ents see the possibility of getting a
start in the pure-bred business without
much expense.

Under the rules of the contest only
gilts farrowed on or after March 1,
1921 are allowed to be used in the
contest. The pigs must be pure-breds
and eligible to registry, and it is per-
missible to buy them of any one hav-
ing pure-breds. A record of the feed
given will be kept for a period of two
months. By figuring up the cost of
gains, rate, amount of feed used in
one day, etc., the contestant will learn
a great deal about growing a gilt.

The pigs will be shown at the North-
ern Indiana fair this fall in a spe-
cial pig club class. Prizes will be
awarded as follows: first \$10; second
\$9; third \$8; fourth \$7; fifth \$6; sixth
\$5; and seventh \$9. Every contestant
who exhibits will be given an exhibi-
tor's ticket free by the fair associa-
tion. For further information write
