THE SECRETARY OF LABOR
Visitors swarm immediately to James J. Davis, secretary of labor, whose chief job just now is settling strikes that no one else can mediate and making flying trips to immigration stations along the Atlantic seaboard.

Davis wears a smile that apparently won't come off, and packs a hand-shake that would make Jack Dempsey wince. Friends of the secretary of labor describe him as a "regular fellow." Davis impresses visitors as having the characteristics of a missionary. He would have made a first class salesman of life insurance or battleships. This is because he seems always to have been just convinced of some important truth which he wants to pass along to somebody else. Davis believes what he believes with his total supply of energy.

One of Davis' firm convictions is that the federal government should undertake the national encouragement of sports and recreation, through establishment of a special bureau. In this bureau he would combine bands and baseball, running and rowing, and everything tending to make the residents of the United States lovers of outdoor sports. As planned by the secretary, the bureau would have a place in the welfare department suggested by the president and now being considered by congress. Davis seldom misses a chance to convert visitors to the need for such a bureau.

Davis, since taking office, probably has been one of the hardest worked members of the cabinet. He has been compelled to work until nearly midnight two or three nights out of every week conferring with leaders of strikes and lockouts. Between times he makes flying trips to New York or Philadelphia to make speeches.

AMERICAN LEGION'S DISARMAMENT STAND

Indianapolis, Ind., June 24.—The American Legion is "unshakably opposed" to any plan for disarmament by the United States which shall not be accompanied by the simultaneous disarmament of the other world powers, according to a statement issued today by Colonel F. W. Galbraith, Jr., national commander of the Legion.

The statement asserts plans are under way to launch in this country a nation-wide campaign advocating disarmament by the United States "on the theory that we shall thus set an example which other nations will be obliged to emulate."

Colonel Galbraith characterizes such a course as "foolish and dangerous." He asserts the "gal of goals" of the American Legion is to bring about world peace, and is making plans toward that end, working in conjunction with affiliated veterans organizations in other countries.

MEXICAN TROOPS OUT

Mexico City, June 24.—(Special to Daily Democrat)—Mexican regular troops were rushed to the states of Vera Cruz and Hidalgo today to end threatened uprisings. The rich oil lands of southern Mexico were believed menaced by General Costulo Perez against whom the troops are marching in Vera Cruz. In Hidalgo the regular forces were ordered to disarm and muster into the state militia which has failed to co-operate with the regular forces.

TO SUE THE TRUSTS

Indianapolis, June 24.—(Special to Daily Democrat)—Trust busting suits may be filed against Indiana dealers in food and other commodities as a sequel to the one charging existence of a nice combine in Indianapolis. Attorney-General Lesh said today.

The attorney-general said he is investigating other lines of business and his effort may lead to filing of suits in Indiana courts charging conspiracy to regulate prices in restraint of trade.

EFFORT OPPOSED

Indianapolis, June 24.—Joseph P. Griffin, president of the Chicago Board of Trade, speaking before the Indiana Grain Dealers' association here today opposed the efforts of congressmen and United States senators to legislate the Chicago grain pits out of business.

Griffin urged the defeat of the bill which is now pending in the senate. Griffin lobbied in the Illinois legislature which had a bill before it to wipe out the board.

Opposition to the bill to prohibit the trading in grain futures, has been voiced by the millers of Indiana who desire the trading in grain futures.

John W. McCord, chairman of the Indiana Public Service commission, was to speak on the general conditions of railroads in the United States.

McCord, who handled the majority of railroad cases presented to the commission, was expected to show the condition of railroads as they are today compared with last year.

B. A. Worthington, president of the C. I. and W. was to talk on the railroad man's point of view.

Officers and three members of the board of directors will be elected.
