PLAN MORE TAXES

Washington, D. C., Jan. 20—
(Special to Daily Democrat)—Raising
of \$1,600,000 in extra taxes in a period
of thirty months has been determined
on by administration leaders as a
means of paying the soldier bonus be-
fore British debt bonds become avail-
able for that purpose. Taxes on gaso-
line, bank checks, automobiles, in-
creased postage and a sales tax on
100 selected articles are to provide
the money, according to plans. This
plan has been worked out in recent
conferences between President Hard-
ing and senate leaders.
