

New York, N. Y., Jan. 19—The mar-
ket was rather quiet today during
early trading and there was little
change in prices. New Haven con-
tinued to lead lower-priced rails and
made an early high at 15%, up 5%.

Canadian Pacific still featured the
dividend payers and all early sales were
above 128.

In the industrial group, General
Electric made a new high on the move
at 144, up 4%, and comparing with the
low last year of 109%; American
Woolen was still strong and the opening
sales of 84½% was within ½% of
Wednesday's high. Steel common was
off 4% at 85½% and crucible was off 4%
to 59. Gulf States steel made a new
high on the move at 67½, up 2½%.
