Have You Had Your Milk Today?

MILK AND THE INFANT

Up to the time for weaning, on year of age, Mother's milk is the ideal food for an infant. It is more suitable for the baby for the simple reason that it is made up of the six constituents of most foods teach present in the amount which is for the best good of the baby's growth and development.

Water is by far the most predominant element in Human milk, it making up over 87 per cent of the whole.

Sugar is the constituent next in abundance. It constitutes 7.1-2 per cent of all the milk of the Mother. This sugar is not the ordinary table sugar, saccharose, or cane sugar, but lactose or milk sugar. This type of sugar is found in the milk of all mammals, and is present in cow's milk to the extent of 4.3-4 per cent. It belongs to the type of foods called carbonhydrates, which consists of such food as fruit, vegetables, etc. Sugar supplies a great amount of energy anent to the growing baby. It acts in a laxative manner on the intestine and to some extent is stored as fat.

Protein is also a constituent and exists in Mother's milk to the extent of 3.1-2 per cent. Protein forms the chief constituent in all meats and is present in lesser and varying amount in practically all other foods. Protein is that substance from which body tissue, muscles, etc., are built up.

Fat exists in both human and cow's milk to the same extent, that is 4 per cent in each. Fat is used as a producer of energy, and an over supply is stored in the body as fat, to be drawn on in case of need.

Salts and vitamins are also necessary constituents of milk. Salts exist in the amount of 0.2 per cent in human milk, and 0.7 per cent in cow's milk. They aid in digestion and in the retention of water in the body. Vitamins are not so clearly understood but they are necessary and protect the baby from certain diseases such as rickets, scurvy, and beri-beri.

Thus, to the growing infant, milk but especially human milk, is a necessity; because it holds the elements mentioned in the right amounts for the needs of the baby. The element protein provides the building material for the growing muscles and tissues while fat and carbonhydrates furnish the fuel. Water aids in carrying off waste, and is also stored in the tissues and body fluids. The salts and vitamins have also their part to play. So an infant should never be taken from the breast unless there are clear indications for doing so, and there are fewer indications for feeding babies by the bottle than commonly supposed. Infants often have intestinal or bowel

trouble while on the breast not because the Mother does not give proper attention to nursing.

Babies should be nursed at regular intervals, at exact times of the day. A baby soon learns when it is feeding time, if fed at these exact hours. From three days to three months, of age a baby should nurse 7 times in 24 hours, at three hour intervals. From 3 to 6 months of age a baby should nurse 6 times in 24 hours, at three hour intervals. After 6 months of age a baby should nurse 3 times in 24 hours, at four hour intervals. An exact time should be set for each nursing and this hour should be observed. The child should be nursed for a period of 20 minutes at each nursing.

If however there is good reason to believe that Mother's milk does not agree with the child, then cow's milk properly prepared is the best substitute. Holstein cows are the best from which to obtain milk for the baby. The milk must be clean, should be fresh, and must come from cows free from disease, especially tuberculosis. The milk must be prepared properly and varied with the age of the child.

Many people use certain foods, already prepared; in fact the children often grow quite fat on them. But fatness is not always a sign of health in an infant any more than an adult, often it is just the opposite. Average healthy male babies weigh 21 pounds when a year old, female babies weigh 20 pounds when one year of age.

Cow's milk is more easily modified than any other substance outside of goat's milk, which is not common in this country. Below is a table representing the composition of human milk, cow's milk, and various proprietary foods for babies. The figures in case of the foods are copied from their own advertisements. A perusal of the tables will enable anyone to determine which would be easier to modify by adding water and sugar, etc., so as to more resemble human milk.

Cow's Milk:—Fat 4 per cent, Sugar 13.4 per cent, Protein 3.1-2 per cent, Salts 0.7 per cent.

Human Milk:—Fat 4 per cent, Sugar 7 per cent, Protein 1.1-2 per cent, Salts 0.2 per cent.

Mellin's Food:—Fat 0.16 per cent, Sugar 79.75 per cent, Protein 10.35 per cent, Ash 4.3 per cent.

Eagle Brand:—Fat 9.61 per cent, Sugar 54.94 per cent, Protein 8.01 per cent, Ash 1.75 per cent.

Iorlik's Malted Milk:—Fat 8.75 per cent, Sugar 67.95 per cent, Protein 16.35 per cent, Ash 3.86 per cent.
