Details for the reception for the distinguished visitor will be announced in a few days, committees being named to look after his reception and to meet him probably at Fort Wayne. It is likely that he will also come here during the next two months to deliver political address but no arrangements will be made for a meeting of this kind when he visits here on April 2nd nor will any conferences be held it is said. Mr. Beveridge served in the United States senate twelve years, has traveled extensively and his writings are considered among the best of the decade his life of Chief Justice Marshall being one of his greatest works. The plans for the meeting here will be in detail in a few days.
