INSPIRING SERMON DELIVERED
AT CHRISTIAN CHURCH LAST
NIGHT BY THE REV. MARTIN

"The Bible as History," was the sub-
ject of the sermon given last night by
the Rev. Martin, evangelist who is con-
ducting the revival services at the
Christian church, pointed out that the
books of the Bible constitute a faithful
record of the real and actual events
that happened during the life of Christ,
and not fiction drawn from some man's
imagination. Jesus Christ, he said, was
first of all a Savior from sin and not a
social reformer. Social reform follows
as a result of sin reform, he said.

The first business of the church is to
preach Christ as a Savior from sin
and then a social reformer, the Rev.
Martin declared last night. To believe
in Christ means more than believ-
ing in him as a good moral character,
it means believing in him as the son
of God, the speaker said.

The Rev. Martin's sermons are all of
a practical nature and of vital interest
to everyone. The subject of the
sermon for Sunday morning will be,
"The What and Where of Forever."


