Late News Flashes

(United Press Service.)

Seabright, N. J. July 7.—High sea
battles between a federal flotilla and
fifteen international rum runners
may be staged off the New Jersey
coast at midnight tonight.

Federal prohibition authorities are
believed on the point of ordering an
attack against the smuggling fleet
which is reported to have six mil-
lion dollars worth of liquor in its
bottoms. As long as the rum laden
vessels keep outside the twelve mile
limit they cannot be ordered off.

Mobilization of an inshore fleet of
auxiliary vessels to run the contra-
band liquor through the federal lines
was underway.

Seattle, Wash. July 7.—Forest fires
raging in four sections of the Pacific
Northwest have caused nearly \$5,000,
000 damage and taken at least two
lives. Only rain will check the
flames which spread with great ra-
pidity following a long dry spell,
lumber men here believe.

Evansville, Ind. July 7.—Using a
fork as a weapon, Ed Williams, 35,
colored, murdered his wife, Alberta,
at their home here last night.

Police found Williams, intoxicated,
in one room and the dying wife in
another. A 12 year old daughter ex-
plained the quarrel to police.

Washington, July 7.—Only 53 days
supply of coal is available for public
utilities, a canvass on June 15 of coal
stocks of electrical and artificial gas
public utilities showed, F. R. Wad-
leight, chief of the newly organized
coal committee of the department of
commerce announced today.

Washington, July 7.—Progressives
in both parties are ready to meet the
attack on the primary system and to
counter attack the primary's foes, they
said today, following announcement of
the nationwide effort to return to the
old convention system of party nomi-
nations.

It is probable that in the coming
congress measures will be introduced
to broaden the primary system, mak-
ing it applicable, perhaps, to nomi-
nation of presidential candidates, so
as to avoid the pre-convention scandals
that nearly always mark presidential
years.

Rio De Janeiro, July 7.—Fort Capa-
cabana, last stronghold of Brazilian in-
surgents who attempted a military
coup d' etat Wednesday, capitulated
after a severe bombardment, and the
rebellion is completely at an end, the
United Press was officially informed
today.

Illinois Troops Ready
Springfield, Ill. July 7.—(Special to
Daily Democrat)—Five companies of
infantry and two troops of cavalry
slept in their armories last night
awaiting a rail strike riot call to
Decatur.

Adjutant General Carlos Black is-
sued the mobilization orders shortly
before midnight when one hundred
shopmen at Decatur roughly handled
two company employees and threaten-
ed to repeat the performances when
several hundred strikebreakers, re-
ported en route to Decatur from St.
Louis, arrive. Outbreaks also were
reported at other points.

Quiet prevailed at Decatur this
morning, Adjutant General Black
stated.

mobilization order follow:

Troops B. Springfield and B. Ur-
bana, 160th cavalry.

Headquarters company 130th in-
fantry, Decatur.

Company A. Decatur, Company B,
Champaign and Company B Delavon,
130th infantry.
