TWO HEARINGS BY TAX BOARD

Hearing Objections to Two Bond Issues To Be Held On July 19th

Notice was received today by Mar-
tin Jaberg, county auditor, from the
state board of tax commissioners, that
hearings on the objections to im-
portant bond issues will be held here
on July 19. The hearing on the ob-
jection to the issue of bonds in the
sum of \$12,000 for the erection of a
new school house in Union town-
ship, which was scheduled to be heard
on July 10, will be held at 10 o'clock
in the morning on next Wednesday,
July 19.

Following the hearing on the Union
township bond issue, the representa-
tive of the state tax board will con-
duct a hearing at 2 o'clock in the af-
ternoon of the same day, on the ob-
jections filed by taxpayers to the pro-
posed issue of bonds in the sum of
\$42,000 for the improvement of the
W. M. Striker road in Wabash town-
ship. The remonstrance to this im-
provement was filed recently after the
contract had been let. The remon-
strance was signed by fifty taxpayers
who give two objections, one that the
contract was not let to the lowest
bidder and that the benefits to be de-
rived from the improvement are not as
great as the cost.

shots.

ing from Longchamps into confusion.

thoroughfare as the cavalrymen tried
to rein their mounts toward the scene
of the shooting.

As the news of the attempt on the
life of Millerand spread throughout
Paris, which was celebrating Bastille
Day, its national holiday, hundreds
of thousands rushed down the Champ
Elysee toward the president's resi-
dence.

Soldiers and police formed a cor-
don around the presidential resi-
dence.

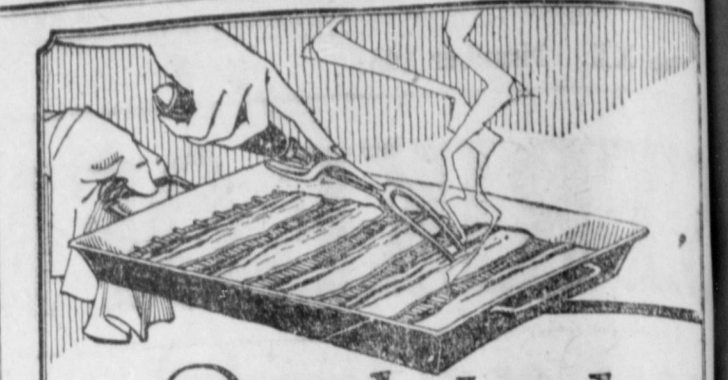
War Weeks' policy in making the
