### NEW DUNES HIGHWAY

#### PAVED WITH CONCRETE

#### TO BE OPEN DECEMBER 1

Indianapolis, July 15.—With con-  
crete being laid at a rapid rate and  
over 3,500 feet of pavement already  
down, every indication points that the  
Dunes highway forming an apline  
route between Gary and Michigan City  
will be opened to traffic December 1.  
This road will be one of the most sub-  
stantial constructed this year by the  
state and federal government, accord-  
ing to John D. Williams, director of  
the Indiana highway commission.

Following a visit of Director Wil-  
liams, Earl Crawford of the commis-  
sion, and C. Gray, chief engineer, it  
was decided to raise the grade 18  
inches above the contract grade where  
the road passes through a big three-  
mile swamp east of Miller. The con-  
crete roadway also will be more heav-  
ily reinforced with steel making it one  
of the most substantial pavements  
ever built in this part of the country.

The General Construction Company,  
one of the contractors on the Dunes  
project, has been authorized by the  
commission to grade and pave the  
1,500 feet of roadway at the north end  
of the roadway in Miller to a connec-  
tion with the Gary street system in  
Miller. This company has already  
graded 4,500 feet of the road, and the  
grade is to be raised 18 inches and  
brought up even with the grade of the  
South Shore Interurban line parallel-  
ing the highway. The additional ele-  
vation is made for safety and in order  
the highway be a permanent trans-  
portation route. The Interurban grade  
has never been inundated by over-  
flow waters, it is said. According to  
state highway officials the section  
west of Michigan City to the Porter  
rad will soon be completed. It will  
be opened first to traffic.

New York, July 15.—Baldwin as-  
sumed the leadership of an outbreak  
of bullish enthusiasm in the equip-  
ment group which was based on the  
encouraging outlook for railroad buy-  
ing during the latter half of the year.  
In the wake of Baldwin's steady  
advance throughout the two hours of  
trading, substantial gains were cross-  
ed by American Lomo and Railway  
Steel Spring.

While the trading in equipment  
stocks was practically the only spe-  
cial feature, the whole market con-  
tinued its remarkable display of in-  
difference to such unsettling factors  
as the railroad strike, the coal strike,  
German situation and lower crude oil  
prices.

These elements have not prevent-  
ed the industrial average from sell-  
ing during the past week at the high-  
est figure reached since the June  
break. Once the general labor situa-  
tion becomes less muddled competi-  
tive observers expect the way to be  
cleared for a resumption of the rise  
in many sections of the market.

## REVIEW BOARD HAS ADJOURNED

### Finish Work Today After Being in Session More Than Month

The Adams County Board of Review  
adjourned at noon today after hold-  
ing a busy session since early in June.  
Most of their work was completed on  
scheduled time yesterday evening, but  
a few matters remained to be disposed  
of this morning. The board made im-  
provement values in most of the  
townships. The largest increase in  
real estate assessments was made in  
Root township where an increase of  
25 per cent was added. The largest  
increase on improvements was made  
in Kirkland township, where 80 per  
cent was added. A representative of  
the board will appear before the state  
board of tax commissioners on July  
21 and the board will be reconvened in  
August to hear a report of the recom-  
mendations made by the state board.  
A horizontal increase may be added  
to the assessments in this county in  
addition to the increases made by the  
board of review.
