**270 Arrested by Game  
Wardens During July**  
Indianapolis, Ind., Aug. 25.—State  
game wardens arrested 270 persons in  
July as against 132 during July a year  
ago, a report of George N. Mannfeld,  
chief of the fish and game division of  
the state conservation department,  
made public today says. Convictions  
numbered 260 as against 126 last July,  
while fines and costs this July totaled  
\$1,885.20 as against \$3,943.35 July a  
year ago.  
The report shows that the major  
offense was taking fur out of season.  
One hundred and thirty-nine persons  
were arrested and so charged. Other  
offenses and arrests were: hunting and  
fishing without license, 64; taking un-  
der-sized bass, 14; possession of ille-  
gal seines, 13; seining and netting un-  
lawfully, 13; hunting on Sunday, 7;  
hunting without permission, 5; killing  
wild birds, 5; possession of spears, 3;  
other offenses, 7.

## Bonus Bill Is Once More Pushed Aside

Washington, Aug. 25.—(Special to  
Daily Democrat)—The bonus bill to-  
day was jammed between pending  
strike legislation in the senate and  
hopes for passage before the middle  
of next week practically were aban-  
doned.

The senate has evidently decided to  
give its first attention to strike legis-  
lation, temporarily laying aside the  
bonus.

Even the most optimistic support-  
ers of the un-amended Fordney-Mc-  
Cumber bill admitted, that in view of  
last minute and unexpected strike de-  
velopments, there appeared little  
chance that the senate could dispose  
of the measure by tomorrow, as they  
predicted earlier in the week.

### G. R. & I. FREIGHT TRAIN COMES APART

While running along at a moderate  
speed a G. R. & I. freight train, north-  
bound, uncoupled in the center Wed-  
nesday night at a point near Bryant,  
Ind., causing the rear end to collide  
with the front section with an impact  
great enough to wreck two cars in the  
train. The cars left the rail and  
blocked traffic for five or six hours. A  
Fort Wayne wrecking crew was rushed  
to the scene of the trouble and  
cleared away the wreck. The box car  
was loaded with lumber and the gon-  
dola contained sand.
