BIG FOUR TRAIN WRECKED TODAY

Eleven Persons Injured
When Train Was Wrecked
at Indianapolis

(United Press Service.)
Indianapolis, Ind., Sept. 1.—(Special
to Daily Democrat)—Eleven persons
were injured when a Big Four passen-
ger train ran through a switch and
plowed into the rear end of a freight
train on a siding near Brownsburg in
Hendricks county early today.
Railroad officials discounted a sabo-
tage theory when it was discovered
the lock of the switch had not been
broken. They said indications were
the passenger train had "split" the
switch and that the wreck was an ac-
cident.

Members of the freight crew declar-
ed emphatically they had closed the
switch and that it had been opened
probably by vandals, after their train
had pulled on to the side track to give
the passenger the right of way.

All cars in the passenger train ex-
cept the Pullmans were derailed. Mrs.
Lizzie Moon, of Paoli, Ind., an invalid
sitting in a wheel chair in the express
car, was thrown through an open door
and sustained injuries which may
prove fatal.

The giant locomotive of the pas-
senger, number forty-four on the Pe-
ria and Eastern division rolled over
leisurely on its side, while passengers
in the day coach and the express and
baggage cars climbed out through win-
dows and doors.
