First tests with the finished ship will soon be made, according to high aviation officials of the war department.

WARNS FARMERS AGAINST FLIES

County Agent Advises Farmers Not To Seed Wheat Before Sept. 25

(By L. M. Busche, County Agent.)
When the Hessian Fly has once become established in a wheat field there is no remedy for it. Accordingly, it is necessary that precautionary measures be taken to avoid having the fly infest the wheat.

Observations of the life history of the fly by experiment stations show that the adult flies emerge from the "flat seed" state in wheat stubble and volunteer wheat, in this locality, about September 25th, or sooner and lay eggs for the next generation on the wheat which is the above the ground. If no wheat is growing at this time it is obvious that the insects will be practically destroyed. Accordingly, no wheat should be sown before September 25th, in Adams County.

In the above recommendations it should be remembered that farmers must cooperate in the matter. A single field of early sown wheat will furnish enough flies to infest an entire locality the following spring. It is realized that the sowing date sufficiently late to be absolutely fly-free would in some cases be the cause of considerable winter-killing. Having given this fact due consideration the date given above is the best to avoid both Hessian Fly and winter-killing.

Corn in All Parts of State is Fired

Indianapolis, Sept. 6.—Weather conditions in Indiana have been variable in places the rainfall has been sufficient to soften the soil for fall plowing, of which a great deal has been done.

Corn is badly fired in all sections of the state. The late planted will be of little value as a grain crop but may be used in some sections as silage. The early planted is fair to good. Some storm and hail damage has been reported. Silo filling has begun.

The movement to market of wheat and rye is rather restricted at this time. Farmers are busy preparing ground for fall seeding and considerably more than usual has been prepared to date.

Oats and barley threshings are completed with yields averaging about as shown in earlier reports.

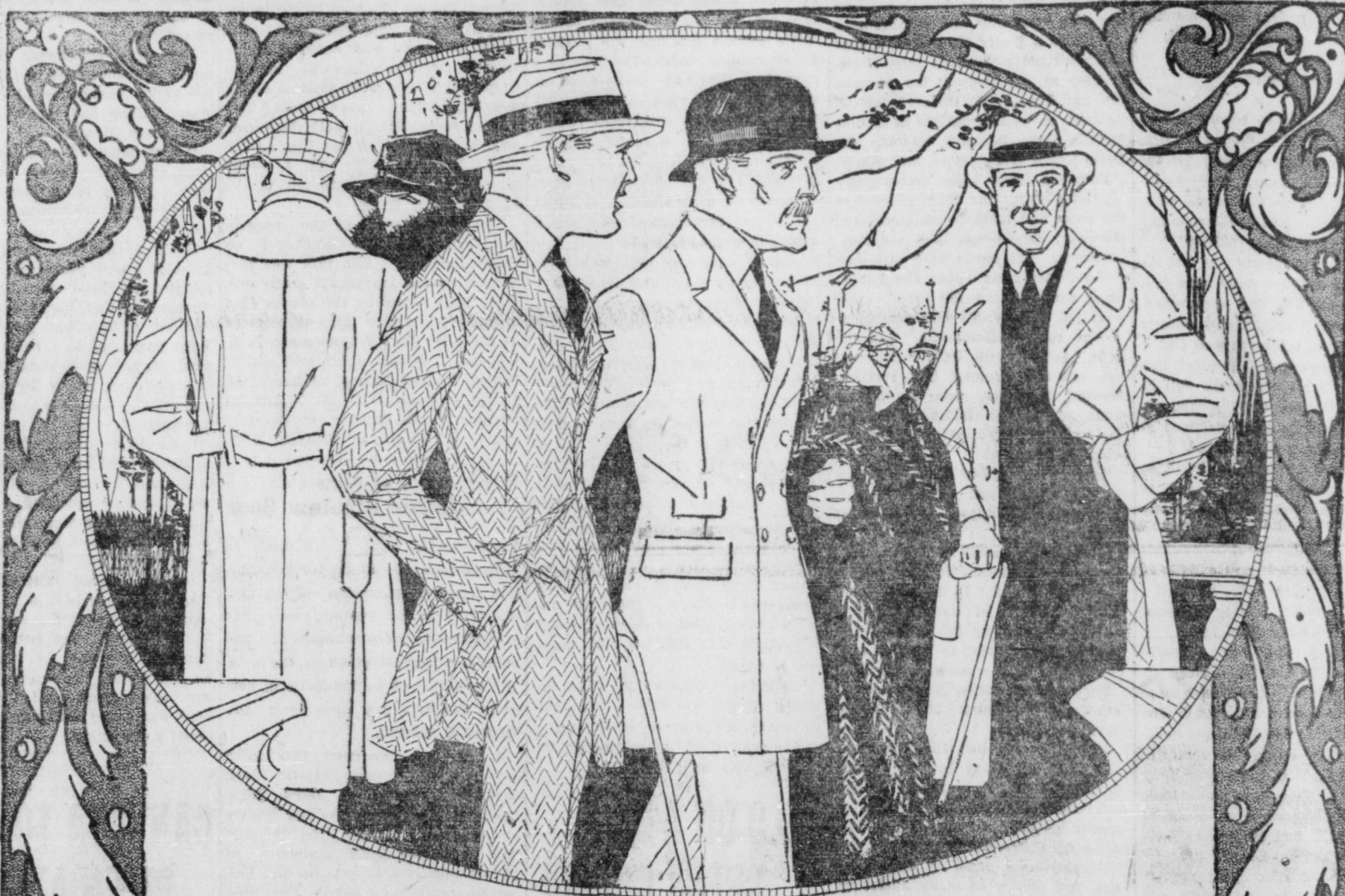
