

Fred Biberstine Died at Bluffton Tuesday

Fred Biberstine, 47 years old, prominent Wells County farmer, died of goitre Tuesday afternoon at 3 o'clock at the Wells County hospital, where he was taken Saturday in an unconscious condition. His illness started a few months ago, after which he took treatment at the Mayo hospital at Rochester, Minn., which failed to benefit him.

It had been intended for him to undergo an operation at Rochester, but his strength never gained sufficiently to permit one. He returned from the hospital two weeks ago. A week ago Monday his condition became extremely critical, since which he has been unconscious the greater part of the time.

He is survived by the widow, who was formerly Mary Bart, the mother, the widow of Emanuel Biberstine and formerly Albertine Bovine, and two children, Andrew, living near Six Mile, and Mrs. Harry Dailey, living at the home of her parents.

The following brothers and sisters also survive: Mrs. J. A. Rehm and Chester Biberstine, both of Ft. Wayne; Frank Biberstine, northeast of Bluffton; Mrs. Ida Hesher, south of Bluffton, and Mrs. Rose Shoup and William Biberstine, both of whom live near Vera Cruz.

Mr. Biberstine was born in Wells County, his home being near Vera Cruz.
