Bob LaFollette has been renominated for United States senator from Wisconsin by a majority over the administration candidate of 178,000 in a total vote of about 400,000. Certainly the administration will feel rebuked over the showing which is perhaps the most decisive so far recorded in a year when anti-administration returns have been the fashion. We do not often agree with Bob LaFollette but he certainly has the confidence of the people he represents and in his attitude of opposition to the Harding administration.

A few people are arguing that in case the Yeomen home and school is located here it will increase taxes by exempting the 1,500 acres from taxes. We do not know whether the land would be so exempted or not or what part of it but we feel sure that the construction of the home here would lighten taxes rather than increase them. The Mooseheart home is located near Aurora, Ill., and that city has grown from 4,000 people to 36,000 adding millions to the tax duplicate. Also the county draws more than any in that state excepting Cook as its proportion of the school fund. The building of a Yeomen school city near here would mean additional railroad facilities and other investments which would overcome any exemption many times over. Don't be foolish. The counties which grow and progress have the lowest tax rates and the most improvements. It's the dead ones which have to groan under heavy burdens for the taxes increase and are paid by an ever diminishing number of people for the youngsters leave to make their homes in those places where they do things.

Most of us are ever looking at the bright spots, seeing only the pleasant and happy side of life and letting ourselves think that everybody is as fortunate as we are. Then someone who has seen the inner side of the way a few of the unfortunates live tells us something. In the south part of the city several families are now living in a degenerate and shameful way, some of the children being terribly diseased, others living amidst surroundings and associations that are bound to ruin them and most all of them without proper nourishment

and guidance. We are told that in several cases the parents are to blame. This is no doubt the truth, for as a child is tutored at home so does he live. In a few cases we are told that many of the children cannot go to school for reason of the diseases from which they are suffering. The community should lend a hand in trying to correct these deplorable conditions. If the children cannot be cared for, educated and given at least half a chance they should be sent to an institution. Living conditions in the southwest part of the city need attention and it's part of your duty to see to it.

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AGED FARMER DIED IN FIELD

Absolone Ginter Found Dead in Corn Field Near Monroe This Morning

Monroe, Sept. 8.—(Special to Daily Democrat)—Absolone Ginter, age 70 years, was found dead in a corn field on the James A. Hendrick's farm, one half mile north of Monroe by his son-in-law, Jesse Johnson, at 11 o'clock this morning. Death is believed to

have been caused by heart prostration and heart trouble.
Mr. Ginter went to the corn field this morning to cut fodder. When he did not return to the house for dinner, his relatives became anxious about him, knowing that he had suffered much trouble with his heart last week and Mr. Johnson went to the field to look for his father-in-law. The deceased is survived by his wife two daughters, and two sons. The children are: Mrs. Charles Hinchon, of Craigville; Mrs. Jesse Johnson, of Monroe; Harve Ginter, of Craigville; and Homer Ginter, of Craigville. No funeral arrangements have been made.

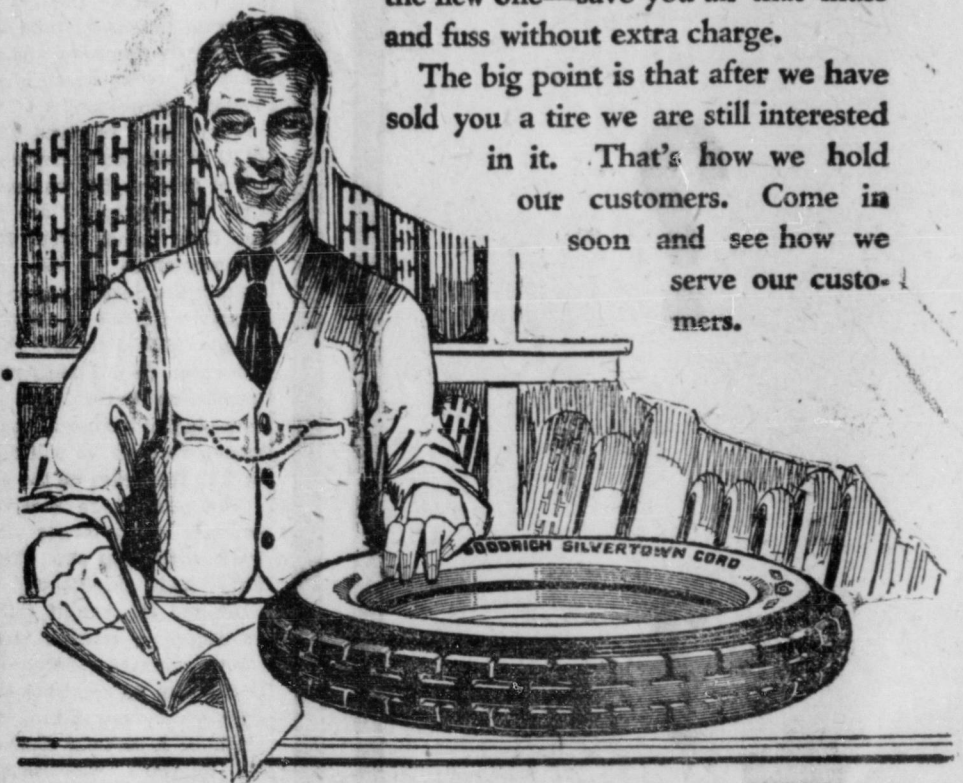
38 Indicted for Part in Herrin Mine Massacre
Marion, Ill., Sept. 8.—(Special to Daily Democrat)—Round-up of Herrin massacre participants was under way today in Williamson county. With the return of 38 indictments by the special grand jury late yesterday, each charging murder, Sheriff Melvin Thaxton assisted by his regular and special deputies today arrested and imprisoned in the county jail here as many of the indicted as could be found.
The first arrest was made by Sheriff Thaxton ten minutes after the indictments had been returned, when he took into custody Philip Fontana, a miner of Marion.

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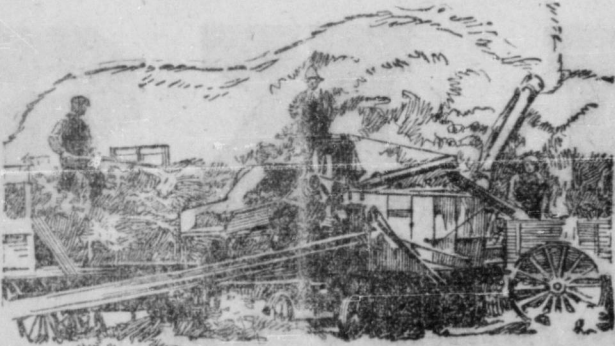
