Jury Disagreed in High vs. Wagoner Case
After deliberating for more than twenty hours, the jury in the case of Smith D. High against Laura Walters and John Wagoner failed to reach an agreement and was discharged at 9 o'clock this morning upon the agreement of both parties.
