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Lake Of Oil Burning In Texas; Big Loss

Houston, Tex., Nov. 14.—A burning lake of oil already has caused property loss of \$100,000 and was still raging in the Humble Oil fields, near here today.

The fire, started by a bolt of lightning, will cause property damage estimated at \$2,000,000, authorities believed today. The lightning struck an earthen reservoir containing more than 500,000 barrels of oil.

Great steam boilers have been moved as close as possible to the huge oil tanks on the Humble property and streams of live steam are being played on the spectacular blaze.

A small artificial lake, caused by recent heavy rains, over which a film of oil has settled, is blazing and menacing several other large tanks.

Proposal means an offer proposing something to be accepted, adopted, considered, especially one made in words.

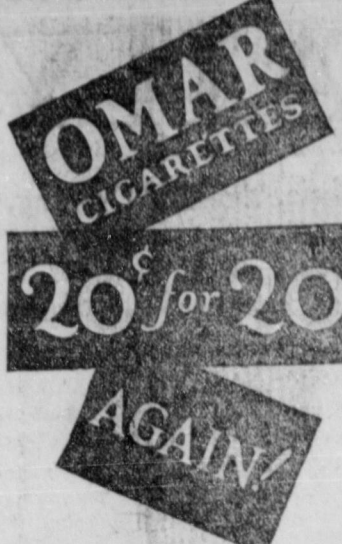
Proposition, a scheme or measure presented for adoption, an offer of terms or conditions. The difference between the two is that we make a proposal to do something but we present a proposition for discussion.
