WILL BUY FIRE TRUCK

Bluffton City Council Votes To Purchase New Fire-fighting Apparatus

At a recent called meeting of the Bluffton city council, it was decided to seek the purchase of a fire truck without the formality of advertising. Members of the council and Mayor Thompson have already made some investigations, and have a pretty fair idea of the cost of machine such as the city needs, and the belief is that the council can drive a better bargain by getting in personal touch with the seller and their machines than they can by advertising and having only the description of the machine to go by.

It is the intention of the council to buy a high-pressure outfit, with a capacity of 600 gallons and a six-cylinder machine. The Stutz at Indianapolis have been investigated and is a wonderful machine. There is also the American La France that the council intends to consider, and probably other machines before buying. It is expected a suitable outfit will cost a little over \$10,000, but will give the city one of the best fire-fighting outfits in the country. The need of something along the line of more power was well illustrated in the H. C. Ray company fire a few weeks ago, and there is a general demand upon the part of the citizens for a splendid fire-fighting outfit.—Bluffton Banner.

TURKS PREPARE FOR NEW ATTACK

Angered By Firm Demands Of Allies And Military Action Of Greeks

(United Press Service)
Athens, Jan. 1.—(Special to Daily Democrat)—Angered by the firm demands of the allies, the Greek military preparation, and the latter country's refusal of a "dishonorable peace," Turkish nationalists are concentrating troops in preparation for an attack on Constantinople, Mosul and other strategic points, according to reports here today.

Beside the strategic moves toward the Mussulman "holy city" and the great oil region, the latter in principal dispute at Lausanne, the Kamelists planned a drive to converge the Bosphorus, unless the Greeks and allies backed down, it was said.

The Kamelists force have arrived at Djizmart, another is advancing toward Tigris, and a third column is reported mobilizing before Adabazar.

The baby died from poisoning, thought to have been carried in milk. The father and mother were also poisoned but have recovered.
