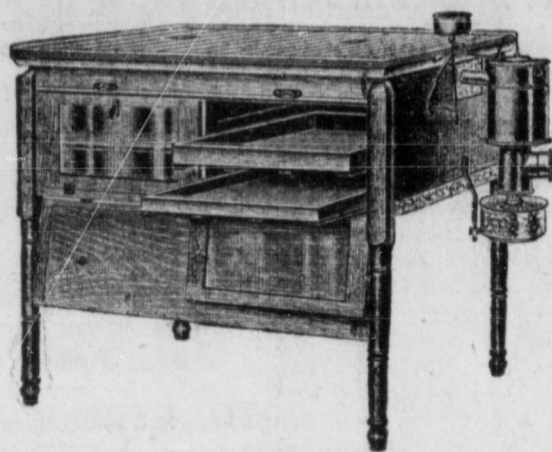

TURKS TALK IN TERMS OF WAR

Order All Allied War Ships to Leave Smyrna Harbor; British Defy Them

(United Press Service) London, Feb. 7.—(Special to Daily Democrat)—The Turkish government has issued an ultimatum ordering all allied war ships over 1000 tons to leave Smyrna harbor before midnight tonight, it was learned on the highest authority today.

In response to the ultimatum, Great Britain sent a war ship of "considerable over 1000 tons" to Smyrna, "to see what will happen."

In the meantime, acting under orders from London, the British acting high commissioner at Constantinople conferred with the Turkish representative at Constantinople, urgently requesting the Angora government to rescind the ultimatum.

The British cruiser to test the Turk is expected to arrive at Smyrna late today.

It is believed here there is little likelihood of serious developments, partially because the harbor is inadequately fortified, with little ammunition.

BREAD FREE IN CHICAGO

(United Press Service) Chicago, Feb. 7.—(Special to Daily Democrat)—Bread was free here today. Eighty-eight stores of a chain of groceries gave a loaf of bread to everyone making a purchase.

The move was the latest development of the cut price war being waged between two chain store organizations. Officials declared bread would be given away "as long as necessary to prove our statement that no one can sell bread cheaper than we can."
