SENATOR NEW IS APPOINTED

Named Postmaster Gener-
al Today by President
Harding

(United Press Service)

Washington, Feb. 27—(Special to
the Daily Democrat)—President Harding
gave Senator Harry S. New of Indiana,
recently defeated for reelection,
a place in the cabinet, today.

The president sent to the senate
the senator's nomination to be post-
master general. New succeeds Post-
master General W. C. of Colorado
who was selected as secretary of
the interior to succeed Albert Fall
whose resignation becomes effective
March 4.

The senate confirmed Senator New
on a motion of Senator Lodge by a
unanimous vote in open session. The
shift in the cabinet will take place on
March 4th.

The President is understood to
have made his selection about ten
days ago. He has been under strong
pressure not to appoint New.

In putting New in the cabinet Hard-
ing is standing by an old friend.
Some factions of the republican par-
ty have bitterly opposed the appoint-
ment.

Work being a western man has
been keenly interested in matters
coming under the jurisdiction of the
interior department.

New is 64 years old. He was born
in Indianapolis and spent most of his
life in Indiana. He was elected to
the senate in 1916 but was defeated
for renomination by Senator Bever-
idge in the primaries last year.

Work is 62. He was born in Indi-
ana county, Pennsylvania. For many
years he was a prominent physician.
President Harding first named him as
assistant postmaster general and then
elevated him to the head of the
department when Will Hays resigned
to become czar of the movies.

Lydia Riley, age 80 years, died at
her home in Blue Creek township,
this morning. Death was due to in-
firmities of old age. Funeral services
will be held from the Salem church at
2 o'clock Thursday afternoon.

Mrs. Riley lived with a daughter,
Mrs. Riley Parker, two miles north
west of Salem. Her husband pre-
deceased her in death. Three sons and
another daughter survive. They are:
Alladin Riley, of Winchester; Brent
Riley, of Blue Creek township;
James Riley, of Ohio; and Mrs. Wil-
liam Merryman, of Blue Creek town-
ship.

Wabash, Ind., Feb. 27.—J. Henry
Hipskind of this city, president of
Post T. in the Indiana T. P. A. or-
ganization, has announced his can-
didacy for the state presidency of
the T. P. A. There are thirty-two
posts in this state and they are al-
ready lining up behind the Wabash
man, who has no opposition to date.

The state convention will be held
in Michigan City on May 18-19 and
the Wabash post is planning to at-
tend almost en masse to further the
candidacy of the local man.

Hipskind has long been a worker
in the state organization and his
ability has been recognized in many
avenues of T. P. A. activity.


