Notice is hereby given that the Board of Commissioners of Adams County, Indiana, at their regular meeting place in the Court House at Decatur, Indiana, will on Tuesday, May 8, 1923, and up until the hour of 10 o'clock a. m. on said day, receive sealed proposals for the construction of the following bridges in accordance with the plans, profiles, detailed drawings and specifications thereof now on file in the office of the Auditor of said county, to-wit:

Zimmerman Bridge, two miles south and one-fourth mile west of Peterson, Kirkland township, Adams county, Indiana.

Holthouse Bridge, one-fourth mile north, two and one-fourth miles west of Peterson, Kirkland township, Adams county, Indiana.

Ringer Bridge, five miles west and one and one-half miles south of Monroe, Indiana.

Bids shall include all labor and first class material for said work. In no case will extra compensation be allowed for any additional work alleged to have been done by the contractor to whom is awarded the contract.

Any one desiring to submit plans and specifications for completion at the same time may do so by filing the same with the county auditor, not less than ten days before the day of letting. Plans and specifications submitted, include the use of any patent device or any article controlled by monopoly, the specifications shall be accompanied by a statement of the terms upon which such device or article may be used or obtained.

Each bid shall be accompanied by a personal or surety bond in a sum equal to double the amount of the bid, filed for the work bid on, to be subject to the approval of the Board of Commissioners. Said bond shall be conditioned for the faithful performance of the work, the sureties, if personal shall be resident free holders of the State of Indiana, one of whom shall be a resident of Adams county.
