Herman Myers Member of Crack Cadet Outfit

Bloomington, Ind., May 16.—H. H. Myers, of Decatur, cadet lieutenant in the Indiana university, R. O. T. C. military unit had the honor of being in a company of 63 studentsoldiers which was awarded a silver cup for its excellent showing in the recent inspection of the state university infantry unit by officers of the regular army. The Decatur student's company was judged the best drilled, best disciplined, and smartest looking company in the entire Indiana university regiment of 725 men.

The inspection of the unit was part of the annual examination by the War Department of all college military units for "distinguished college" honors. Indiana university first won this high honor in 1920, after the R. O. T. C. regiment was established in 1917 and each year since has continued to win "gold star" recognition from the war department. The examining officers expressed themselves as well pleased with the splendid showing of the Indiana unit this year and the greatest optimism prevails on the campus over Indiana's chance of again winning distinguished college rating from the war department. Major R. E. O'Brien, former Lawrenceburg, Indiana boy, is in command of the I. U. R. O. T. C.

Only about thirty schools giving military instruction, or 20 percent of all such schools throughout the United States, win high distinction. Indiana, with "gold star" units at Indiana university, Purdue and DePauw, at present boasts more star units than any other state in the Union. In the fifth corps area last year, Ohio with five R. O. T. C. schools, got only one recommendation for high honors, West Virginia and Kentucky also got one each; while Indiana got three. Among the distinguished guests at the Indiana university inspection this year were Warren T. McCray and General Herbert M. Ford, director of the budget of the United States.

In addition to Lt. Myers three other Decatur students, H. W. Christy, J. C. Miller, and Eddie Johnson, are members of the Indiana university R. O. T. C. this year.




