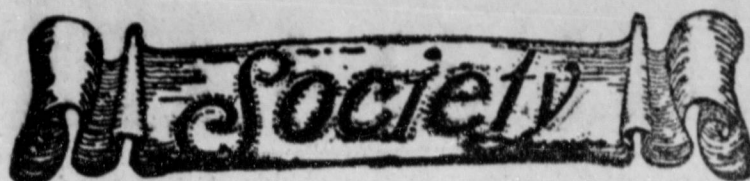

Jim Stults Also Recalls Seymore And Blair Rally

When Jim Stults read the story yesterday evening about Preble township winning the silk flag for having the largest delegation to the Seymore and Blair rally here in 1868 he recalled the day with pleasure.

His father, Jacob Stults led the delegation from Union township and had the second largest. One of the features which attracted most attention was a specially constructed wagon on which rode forty girls, dressed in white. Jim rode with his father on the front seat of the wagon and yelled for Seymore and Blair until he was hoarse. The "fairy wagon," as it was called, made such a hit that the judge decided to also award a silk flag to Union township and did so. John Stults had the flag until a few years ago when he gave it to the trustee of Union township who no doubt still has it. Jim says it was one of the biggest days of his youth and he will never forget it.
