


Franklin—Nineteen have joined the boys' and girls' pig club directed by O. S. Williams, county agent.

Building Trade Workers In Chicago Get Raise

Chicago, June 1—(Special to Daily Democrat)—Suspension of Chicago's \$300,000,000 construction boom was averted today when an agreement was reached giving the 13 "open shop" building workers a 20 percent pay increase. The new wage is effective today and increases the pay of the so-called "basic trades" to \$1.25 an hour. Other workers will receive wages ranging from \$1.05 an hour for stone planer men to \$1.37½ an hour for stone carvers.


