New York, June 8.—Having given little expression of opinion regarding the new German reparations note in the previous session, stocks on the exchange today were equally non-committal in the early dealings, regarding the likelihood that France would respect Berlin's latest offer. Wall street felt that the terms suggested at least opened the way for renewed discussion and the active issues showed a disposition to await further developments in this direction, before passing judgement.

Steadiness in the general list demonstrated that in the meanwhile the business situation was favorable enough to relieve any apprehension that a continued unsettlement abroad might interfere with domestic property.


