last day for the payment of Jack
Dempsey's final \$100,000. In the last
48 hours, the town has been receiving
a steady trickle of new inhabitants
from the outside and the busy hours
of the day find the sidewalks as
crowded as a street in the Bronx at
baby buggy hour.

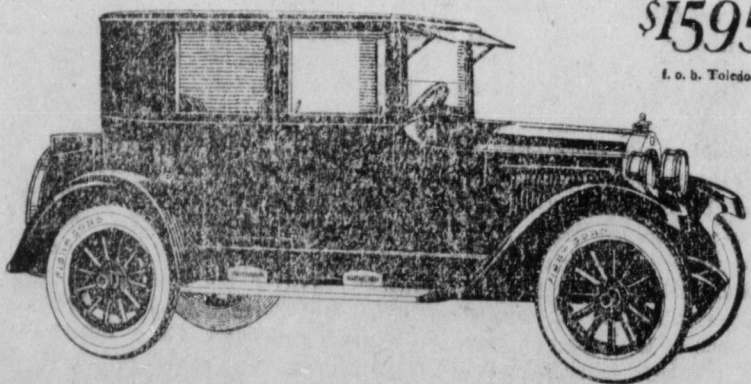
