Annual Encampment Of Veterans To Be Held In Indianapolis July 13

Indianapolis, July 6.—With General John J. Pershing and General Henri Gouraud, the one-armed fighter of France, among the guests, veterans of the Rainbow division from 28 states will gather here July 13 for their three days' annual encampment.

General Gouraud, under whose command the division served in the Champagne defensive of July, 1918, left Paris on June 23 for the United States.

the Germans launched their final offensive against American and French troops in the Champagne in 1918.

A great barbeque will be held for the veterans at the State fair grounds on Saturday night. Wives of the former service men will be entertained at a special banquet downtown.

On Sunday morning special memorial services will be held at the Soldiers and Sailors monument for the fallen Rainbow veterans. The reunion will close Sunday evening.

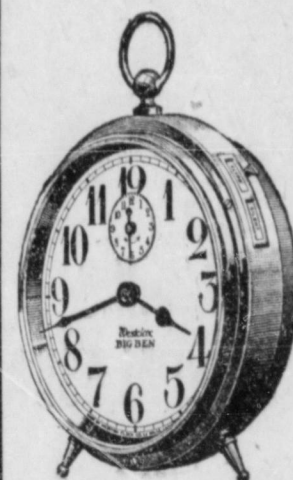
The reunion of the division which
